### Kyleakin Shops up until 1960 by Ruth Macdougall

When the 2nd Lord MacDonald established a fishing station by the name of Kyleakin, he also founded Skye's first shop, geographically speaking. That was over 200 years ago, at the end of the 18th century. How have Kyleakin's shops changed over the years?

If we assume that the first shop was at the pier on the site of the Brightwater Centre, the next known building was a salt store. Sometime in the 1920's there was a shoemaker here and in 1924 Mrs Graham's opened her shop, 'The Dairy', where she sold produce such as milk, butter and crowdie from the family farm (Kyle Farm, at the other end of the village) as well as groceries. The shop was built by McKerlich's, Kyle, and there was also a tea room. In 1930 the Cameron family bought the business and Charlie Cameron added to the building which became Cameron's Stores. This was a general store, tea room and boarding house during the 30's and 40's, petrol and Calor Gas were also sold here and a drapery and souvenir department was added in the 1950's. For many years the shops on this site were known locally as "the Dairy".



Behind this building and beside a house called Ferry Cottage (demolished in the 1950's to make way for the road) was **Neil MacLean's** butcher's shop. He sold meat as far afield as Breakish, from his bicycle.

Where the White Heather Hotel is now was the **White Heather** Café with a shop area selling ice cream, crisps, etc, run by Wacek and Ena Sikorski (the latter being the daughter of Mrs Graham, above). The cottage on the site was converted from 1949 by Wacek who also built the tables and seats in the café and over the years expanded the business.



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Moving up the pier - a real hive of activity - was another butcher's shop, **Grigor's**, beside Duncaan. Although the owners were Grigors from Mallaig, the butcher who worked there for many years was the well known Duncan Tuach from Ross-shire. He will be remembered collecting his meat deliveries from the train in Kyle and bringing them over the ferry on a barrow. When he was away, Joe Wiseman from Mallaig provided holiday cover. Does anyone remember Joe enjoying a dip in the sea?

Duncan Tuach lived next door in the building occupied by **Johnnie Munro** (Johnnie Uisdean) a real character, well remembered by Ian Robertson in our DVD and whose shop (H & J Munro) sold paint, paraffin, ships' chandlery, fishing tackle, some groceries and was also a betting shop. It could be daunting as a youngster to go into that dark shop to buy biscuits when Johnnie was occupied with his older betting customers who were colourful local characters. It's not quite so daunting now as Harry's coffee shop!

The corrugated iron building where we now have a part time post office has had a variety of occupants: it was owned by Mrs Graham and was where Mary MacDonald, the dressmaker, worked before and possibly during the time of World War II. In the 50's and early 60's it was Lochcarron Handloom Weavers (nicknamed **the Tweed Shop**) whose assistants were Peggy MacPherson, then Catriona Finlayson (Tana). Behind it there may have been a blackmith's shop.

Crossing over the Corran now and behind the new flats, Obbeside, which used to be the Marine Hotel and Seaview, was a **Bakery** in the 1920's, said to have belonged to Martina Robertson. There was a bank of cinders on the shore nearby which one of our contributors remembered his mother telling him was from the bakery. The Marine Hotel itself also sold 'odds and ends' in those days.

Probably the most important shop in the village at one time was the **shop and post office** built and opened by Donald Macpherson in 1902 in what was known as the Heathmount building and which today is Saucy Mary's Bar and Hostel. The Macpherson family continued to run this business after Donald's death in 1934 until the **Macrae** family acquired it in 1945 and operated the post office, grocery, newsagent and petrol pumps. In the earlier days of the telephone, it also included a small, manual telephone exchange.





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Next door on the site of Glen Arroch was **lolaire** (the Eagle Inn) where there was a shop owned by Toady Munro, a relative of Johnnie Munro and you could buy bread there; was there any connection to the Bakery at the back of the Marine Hotel?

**Benmore,** Skye Backpackers, was where Donald Macpherson and his uncle had the post office and shop before they built Heathmount in 1902. In the 1950's Neil Macpherson had a ladies' and gents' hairdressing business in the front room nearest to Bellevue.

Between Benmore and the Old School is Bayview and there, first, Donnie Lamont had a café where he sold ice cream made from his own Italian recipe. Later it became **H. Lamont's** shop where Hector's sister, Lena (Mrs Nicolson) sold drapery, wool etc. The shop was loved by the schoolchildren next door for the selection of sweeties they could buy for a few pennies.

Opposite the church on the corner of Meuse Lane was a corrugated iron **tailor's** shop where Mr MacKinnon was the tailor and Murdo Montgomery his apprentice. Murdo (Monty) was tailor there until he retired. Some of the local men would congregate here to listen for news of the Kyleakin fishing boats which you got on the radio fishing stations.





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After World War II, **mobile shops** took to the road and there was the Co-op from Broadford (Neil the Co-op), Fraser & MacColl's hardware shop from Inverness, Ronnie Matheson from Portree with groceries and Miss Thompson from Glasgow who sold drapery from her van.

Over the next decades there were inevitable changes and additional shops further "up the village" and Part II in a future newsletter will detail these. In the meantime, if you have any further information, we would like to hear from you so that we can add more colour to this picture.

Our grateful thanks for help with these recollections go to Morag Macrae, Cathy Reid, Richard Robertson and Ena Sikorski, senior members of our community.

Whilst researching old maps I came across one of Kyleakin dated 1889 and it shows a 'Doctors Rock' (or rocks). Can anyone tell me the reason for this name as I am sure there is a story attached?
